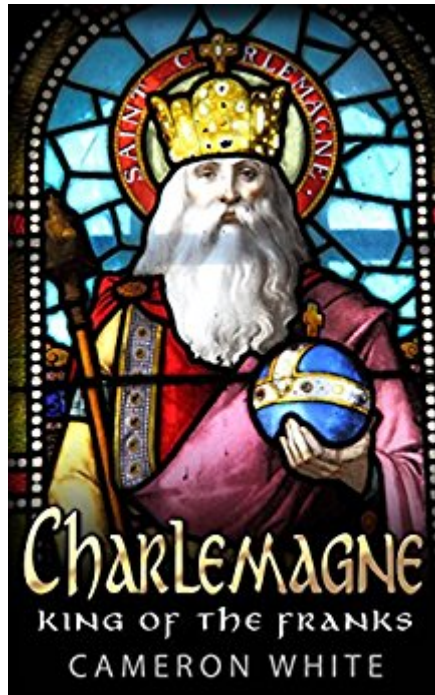

This book was a decent primer on its subject, but suffers from a lack of depth and some nonexistent

editing. Worth reading for free but kind of a poor excuse for a professional biography. The author contradicts himself, too, i.e. stating on one hand how conquest and tribute provided little income in one chapter, then describing this income as vast and significant in another. I don't feel like I wasted my time reading it, nor do I feel like I just received a masterful education on Charlemagne.

Enjoyable book and it filled in a lot of information on a king I have heard about but never researched. Honestly it is easy to get lost in the myriad politics but the author did a good job avoiding too large a picture which would detract from the main character. There were some mentioned treaties broken which means that something caused the offender to feel they had the ability to challenge Charlemagne's authority that I was left unclear on but my preference would be to leave those for follow up study rather than have the author write a treatise on the entire political situation surrounding Charlemagne. One thing that really struck me was the practice of splitting the kingdom between all sons which seems designed to weaken a strong Frankish kingdom through balkanisation. I found this interesting because it is so different than what we are used to. Overall I really enjoyed the book but I believe it is one I need to read/listen to again with a notebook to list some follow up topics.

I am not sure how much you can demand from a free e-book, and there were parts that were

reasonably well done. Unfortunately, other parts clearly showed a lack of understanding. It had the feeling of having been written by a high school student, and not an especially good one. I would find it hard to believe that the author ever studied economic history or economics, or history beyond the high school level. It is an easy read, and if you are looking for light reading for enjoyment you could do worse. On the other hand, if you are a student I would strongly recommend you avoid using it as a reference work.
